

Demo Opportunity...



us. He made some beans and sausage.


Teresa Gabrish brought her wire wrapping and made some new designs while at the picnic.


joyed at lunch. Please remember Vaughn Foods for you future bulk food needs. We always have plenty of food so if you went away hungry it was your own fault.



THE WEDGE JOINT

Len Ledet

In January Caleb Cullman conducted a "Innovating with Joinery" class (see March 2010 issue THE ANVIL'S HORN – page7) at Sahuaro Ranch Park. One of the joints discussed and constructed was a WEDGE Joint. The following illustrates the components required and the material sizes we used during the exercise. The key to understanding the join – the vertical member's square slit and drifted hold must be big enough to allow the horizontal member and the wedge strap to fit thru it. Try it, it was a very good forging exercise.



How To Make a Section Through a Cone-

This is good to know if you want to make forms for frying pans, backs of coal shovels, bands for barrels and buckets, or any place you need to end up with a section through a conical shape.

You need to make a full size drawing of the side view of your conical shape and use that to construct the side view of a cone. Draw a centerline (\$\mathbb{L}\$) between the sides of your conical section. Extend the sides of the conical shape until they intersect the centerline - this is the point of the cone.

The distance from the point of the cone to the side of your shape, (X), defines the radius you will need to make your first bend in your stock.

Figure out the top and bottom circumference. (Tcirc), (Bcirc) using the formula:

Circumference = 2π r or 2 x 3.1416 x r


This will give you the length of the stock you need to bend.

Lay out the two radiuses (X and X + the material width). I find it's easier to add some to each end because you're going to bend this the hard way and it's hard to get a nice bend on the ends which you can cut off later.

When you have this bend made, you now bend it to the diameters of the top and bottom of your conical shape. Remember as you bend this, you're making a cone and it should be coming out so it will lay flat. It is easier to bend from both ends and finish by bending the middle. That way you can sort of see how the two ends are coming together.

As you can see in examples A-D, as length (X) gets shorter the angle at the cones point gets larger. This causes the sides of the conical section to lay over farther. Obviously when (X) equals the radius of the (Tcirc) a flat circle is the result.

To see if you like your conical shape, make a mockup by laying out the two radiuses on card stock and cutting them out Also remember metal bends down the middle so the thickness of your stock and the width of your stock will affect the finished shape. But, remember you are going to be doing a lot of banging around so the final size will vary.


Paul Zimmermann's Harmony Element

Paul Zimmermann developed this form approximately thirty years ago as an answer to the traditional scroll work his clients were requesting, as taking blacksmithing into more modern forms has always been the goal of his work. He realized early on that, often times, when a client would request scroll work, it wasn't so much the scroll itself they found appealing, but rather the movement of line and form. In the eighties Paul received the *Staatspreis* for a screen using this form. In Germany this is the highest prize awarded for applied arts.


Located in Pliezhausen, Germany, Atelier (Studio) Zimmermann has been a forerunner for bringing the traditions of blacksmithing into a contemporary design context. Paul and Heiner Zimmerman's works are characterized by a high definition and clarity of design that is most apparent in the grave markers they've created.

Through years of international lectures and demonstrations, the Zimmermanns have become ambassadors of the craft through an open exchange of skills and design philosophy. I hope that if more people are exposed to their work through this step-by-step photo story and their website, they will be inspired to design in the present. Paul at the power hammer. Note he is using slightly curved drawing dies. The form can be forged out of square, round or flat bar using the same methods that follow. In this case I use 35mm x 6mm to achieve a larger form because, as the steps progress, you are left with more material to work with. The measurements I give are only as reference points.





Draw out both ends of your bar creating a quick transition into a cross section of approximately 10mm x 10mm. Then offset each leg creating a flat side and a humped side on the piece.



Bend the original sized material into a "U" shape. This is one of the most important steps in the process. The curve should be graceful inside as well as outside.

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






Take a good heat on the curved section and begin to spread the material as uniformly as possible. Rotate it under the hammer in a circular motion to distribute even blows, thinning the outside while keeping the inside a little thicker.




Now you will curve the piece in two directions.



It is best to really analyze the piece now because once you begin the next step, there is no opportunity to tweak. Using a dome-faced hammer, even up the curves and smooth out any kinks that may have developed.



Forge the piece over the horn while also lifting up slightly.



Moving closer to the tip of the horn begin to forge the piece into a graceful curve behind itself.




Bending forks and a torch are also useful tools to get good results. At this point as you work the piece, periodically turn it and look from all sides. Even up any remaining kinks or flat spots.

Harmony




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Paul would always remind me that working this form is an exercise and should always be experimented with to find something new. So get out to the shop and experiment! ♣

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Dividing Circles

Would you like to be able to divide a circle into an equal number of spaces? For instance, maybe you'd like to lay out a 5 pedal rose blank that is 3 inches in diameter. *Chordal Values* are the easy way to get it done.

From the chart below select 5 from the divisions column and multiply the number in the Length of Cord column times the diameter of the circle.

 $.5878 \times 3 = 1.7634$


Set your dividers to 1.7634 and walk them around the perimeter of the circle.

What? Your tape measure only reads fractions? One cheap solution is to get a pair of digital calipers. I have a few cheap ones—that cost around \$20 from places like Harbor Freight and they work great. Of coarse, you can spend several hundred and get more expensive ones—I've got those, too.

Need more than 32 divisions? <u>Machinery's Handbook</u> lists up to 194 divisions.





