The SE Saltfork group met on Dec. 1 at Bois D'Arc Forge Blacksmith Shop in Paris, TX with six attending. It was a cold blustery day but we accomplished a little forging on our "leaning how to make tongs" project. Brazos White and Howard Bost did most of the work while the rest of us watched with interest after we again watched the Bill Epps' DVD on making tongs.

Howard Bost brought back one of my old Champion forge blowers that I had given him to repair. It worked "a little" when I got it several years ago, then it locked up and some of the ball bearings fell out. I just put it aside figuring someone would come along who could repair the thing. As it turns out, Howard has rebuilt around 16 or so of these blowers and is getting to be an expert on them. So if anyone has one of these blowers that need rebuilding, you should consider calling him.

We did have one visitor and potential new member, 14 year-old Alex Salas and Lyn, his mother, stopped by and I gave him a short lesson in making an S hook. I think that "hooked" Alex and he may be back for a series of lessons in basic blacksmithing after the first of the year. He says his interest is in making a sword, so we will see how that progresses.

Next meeting will be January 5, 2008 at the Bois D'Arc Forge Blacksmith Shop, 33 NE 1st Street, Paris, TX 75460. No trade item and the program will again be on tool making, probably a continuation of making tongs.

Bois D'Arc Forge Participates in Art Walk 2007

For the second year, Bois D'Arc Forge Blacksmith Shop participated in the Paris Art Walk, which showcases artist studios and specialty shops

in the downtown historical district. The weather was mostly pleasant and traffic was good with a total of 92 visitors to the shop during the four-night event held over two weekends.

Showcase for the event was the almost-completed wine cellar door for a local client. The door fits under a curved staircase that we constructed this past spring and summer. The concept for the door is "frameless" with only the four hinges providing support. The door is comprised of two doors that open



outward from the center and is three-dimensional. It is approximately 5 inches in depth and 26 inches wide. Both doors open out into the home's formal foyer and can be displayed either closed or open.

All "vines" were hand forged from solid round bar from ³/₄ to ¹/₄ inch diameter and were heated, hammered, bent and twisted. The leaves were hand made from 14-gauge plate. Hand-made tendrils and thirteen hand-made grape clusters also adorn the door. Finish was obtained by a chemical staining process and sealed with lacquer.
