Wooden Wagon Wheel Work / Douglas, OK / Tom Nelson's Shop

Photo 01:

A rebuilt wooden wagon wheel. This wheel is one of 4 that had extensive rot in part of one felleo – the part left in contact with the ground for a long time. A section of the old felleo and a couple of spokes were sent as patterns and an order for new parts placed with an Amish wheel wright in Ohio.

The spokes from Ohio are received at Tom's shop with a few inches extra length. The Amish craftsmen steam bends and ships the felleo in a 180° arc; he adds a little extra material at each end to allow for a trim fit with the old felleo. The new spokes are lubricated with boiled linseed oil and driven into the hub. A length out to the shoulder on the spokes is determined and a tenon cut on each spoke end. The felleo is drilled (7 places for this wheel) for the spoke tenons. The felleo is fit to the wheel and spokes. The extra material on the ends is trimmed to fit very close to the existing felleo; a gap of about 1/8 to 3/16" at each felleo joint is common. After final assembly, these joints close from the shrinking in place of the tire iron (steel band).



Photo 02:

After the wood work is complete, the wheel is mounted on the tire stand. It is now ready to receive the tire (steel band). The outside circumference of the wooden wheel is measured using a traveler. From this circumferential length the width of the gaps between the felleos is subtracted to give the length around the wheel after final assembly – no gaps.



Photos 03 & 04:

The tire is spaced up off the ground a few inches and a hot fire built all around it. The inside circumference of the tire when cold is made to be about 1/4 to 3/8" less than the circumference of the wooden wheel. When heated the tire expands so that it can be put over the wheel. Sometimes it slips right on; most often it has to be pried and hammered so that it is centered on the felleos.

Photo 05:

Once the tire is properly fit to the wooden wheel a stream of water is used to cool the steel. As the steel cools, it shrinks around the felleos compressing them to the tenon shoulders on the spokes and closing up the felleo gaps. This makes a very strong assembly.



For more on wagons, wooden wheel work, and the related blacksmithing work, see Foxfire Book No. 9. The Jud Nelson (not kin to our man Tom) wagon story is right interesting.





S/C Regional meeting..

The day started cold and rainy, wondering if anyone would even show up to eat this huge pot of stew, furthermore, seemed like a lot of people did not realize this was the third Saturday of the month, the date was a little earlier than one would expect for the third Saturday. First to arrive was Terry Jenkins and Dawnavan Crawford, Terry came up to Mills carrying a bucket, when Mills gave a quizzical look, Terry explained the bucket was for him to “carry the tune in” he was singing. Bruce Willenberg came in bringing donuts, soon after others started to arrive, my concerns about participation were soon put to rest, by noon approximately 30 people had arrived. Dawnavan demonstrated working some alloys with a coal forge, Mills demonstrated making punches from ball-peen hammers, says it was a little humbling experience, but Terry and some others assisted, end result being the novice smith and the experienced smith learned some things about punches. Mills also gave instruction on constructing and using a gas forge in which he utilized his 1920's handbook, Nolan Walker generously donated “coke” for coal forges. For additional entertainment at no extra cost, Mills drove the shop Fork-lift through the crowd and picked up and moved the Power-Hammer out for participants to use. Donnie Foster and other interested parties who had never used a Power-Hammer before seemed to really enjoy learning to manipulate steel with the hammer, material used for the Power-Hammer was 4 inch piece of 1- 1/4 round, S7, stretched out to 20 inches. Lunch was I am told really great stew, by: Linda, lots of crackers and cornbread, cheese, deserts brought by others, the ladle used to dip the stew was forged by the late Larry Morefield, The hard-core of the day award went to Bailey Upchurch a 13 year old girl, with great passion for blacksmithing, bound her hands in duct tape when she wore blisters on them, she stayed till lights out practicing the art, with instruction from Mills and Nolan, thanks to her Father Ralph, and brother Wyatt, who had the patience to allow her to blossom. One final very important note for the day, Ron Lehenbauer had wanted to come and demonstrate, said due to his health does not know how much longer he will be able to. However to everyone's disappointment he was admitted to the hospital unable to attend, to you Ron a loud ring from hammer to anvil from all your fellow blacksmith's.



This owl is based on one wrote up by Clay Spencer using heavier material,

This one is made using $\frac{1}{4} \times 1$ " stock so that it can be easier to forge during a public demonstration.


Start with a piece of $\frac{1}{4} \times 1$ " stock long enough so you don't need to use tongs.

Heat about 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ " of the end to a bright Red.




Place the end of the stock on the edge of the anvil. Hit the other end of the stock until you create a "v" shaped notch about $\frac{1}{8}$ " deep in the center of the end.


Next, take $\frac{1}{4}$ " punch and punch the eyes $\frac{1}{4}$ " in from each side and $\frac{3}{8}$ " down from top. (Measurements are from the center of the hole)



Next, using a round end punch made from a ball bearing 1" to $1\frac{3}{8}$ " diameter. Set it over each punched holes and drive them both down evenly until the stock around each hole is about $\frac{1}{8}$ " thick.



It will tend to push up the ears and make the eyes slightly oval




Next, using a rounding hammer, start in the center and begin flattening the area about 1 1/2" long

You now have the choice of leaving the hammer marks to simulate feathers or you can create your own feather texture.

From here it is up to you. This could be used as a handle or cut off and used as a ornament.

Tip for punching holes:

To make it easier to remove the punch - when you turn your material over to punch out the "biscuit" drive the punch until it sticks out passed the surface of your material a little.





Now place the steel over the anvil and give it a tap, the punch will pop loose because of the taper of the punch.

Sometimes, if you drive the punch only until it has sheared out the "biscuit" the punch will still be tight in the hole.


Try this technique to help simplify hole punching.

Bill Fugate's Collar Jig

Here are some pictures of the collar clamp. Also included is a shot of a "Boyd Holtan" trivet. The clamp is intended to sit atop the vise jaws. The collar is set in the clamp and heated cherry red. The trivet is then set in the collar and vise tightened to close it. The ends of the collar are then closed over and set tight with a hammer.



I've made 20 or more trivets like this for gifts and as a result have a whole set of jigs to speed up the process. I've always fought the collars, so I recently made this collaring jig. Now I can install three collars in about 5 minutes.




Francis Whitaker's Collar Formula

To collar SQUARE or RECTANGULAR shapes:

Add perimeter of material being collared plus 2-1/2 times the thickness of the collar material.

To collar ROUND shapes:

Add diameters of material being collared plus 3 times the thickness of the collar material.
