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Peter Ross's Butterfly Hinge

LIFT THIS SECTION OUT AND START YOUR PROJECTS NOTEBOOK TODAY

Shepherdstown, West Virginia Originally published in The Anvil's Ring, Vol 10, #3, Fall 1982

To make a colonial-style butterfly hinge, start with 16 ga. to 1/8" stock as wide as you want your hinge joint. Use a section of iron long enough to hold one end in your hands while working the other end....24 to 30 inches is about right. You will need to

make a special tool to form the pin barrel. It is made by brazing a rod the size of the hinge pin to a mild steel block.

To begin, scarf both ends of the hinge stock slightly. Mark points to be bent-usually, 1 1/4" to 1 1/2"- and bend to 90 degrees.



Using the tool in a vise. Hinge stock is bent at 90 degrees and clamped in place with the tool, then bent up and over.

Place the hinge tool and the hinge stock in the vise and bend to form the start of the hinge barrel. It may be helpful to bend the hinge wire into an L-shape, since the pin will often want to jump out of the barrel while bending.



The hinge after welding. Correct bowed barrel if necessary.

Place the pin in the barrel and finish bending. Flux and weld the full length of the hinge, starting at the center and working toward the edges.

If the barrel is bowed after welding, peen on the back of the hinge to straighten it.

Spread to a butterfly shape with a cross-peen hammer on hinge back side.

Check spread against a pre-made pattern, cut and remove pins. Do

Cut away the excess hinge stock. Use a pattern to be sure you leave enough material.

the same to the other end.

If one of your hinges is more bowed than the other, use the straightest half for the female side of the hinge. Mark male and

female halves, hacksaw and chisel the barrel to desired dimension leaving plenty of stock to file finish. Generally, the center barrel (or the "male" half) is cut larger than

the other half. For example, if your hinge is 1° wide, you might mark your cuts at 1/4" to be cut out after using the

tern. Mark the edges while assemand 3/4". Flatten part of barrel bled to ensure alignment of the two halves.

hacksaw. This allows a clean cut with the chisel. A cape chisel is the tool to use for cutting out the barrels.

Use pattern to mark one side. Thim one side and assemble the two halves together. Trim on the line with chisel, shears, saw, etc. This will test the strength of your weld. A little separation is normal, but if the majority of the hinge delaminates when trimming, it should be discarded. Mark and trim the other side using the paper pattern.

To permanently assemble the hinge, file the barrel edges to assure smooth movement. Insert the pin and mushroom at each end. File finish all edges, then use a hole block and cold-punch nail holes.

If all goes well and I have not left too much out of the instructions, your finished hinge should look like this.

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Colonial Candle Chandelier

Not bad for starting with only a drawing.

If you have assumed that all Colonial blacksmiths are in the eastern United States, you have been mistaken, because Gary Brown lives in Long Beach. Actually, Gary does not favor Colonial designs as much as he favors Colonial period blacksmithing processes – and he stays with those processes in his ironwork as much as possible.

This summer, Gary came across an old drawing he received from a friend 15 or 20 years ago of a four-candle chandelier of Colonial design that was being made by the people at Williamsburg in the mid 1990s. The drawing was dated 1955, but there was no name on it. When he got the invitation to demonstrate for an October 2009 Memorial Hammerfest for Bob Nett, he thought he would use the chandelier as his demo piece.

He began by making one arm of the chandelier out of ¼" x 1" flat bar as noted on the drawing. He emailed photos to his friend Kenny Swartz at Williamsburg. After collaborating on the project, both smiths agreed that his approach was period-correct, but Kenny suggested that ½" x 1" flat bar would provide more bulk for spreading the material for the cups. Gary explained that during the Colonial period, designs were light in weight due to the scarcity and expense of material.

Alex Bashta and others each took a turn operating Gary's restored bellows. Each heat begins with a strong



burst of air into the tuyére; refill the bellows with air; then push the operating lever up and down in short, smooth, continuous-motion strokes to keep an even flow of air going into the fire – slow for low heat, faster

for higher heat - a good toning exercise for upper arms!

Gary made a chain of seven twisted links with connecting round links at either end and a two-piece



Forge the loop piece of the swivel out of 1/2" or 5/4" square. Taper both ends to 1/2" diameter, putting a tapered transition to a swollen area in the center of the ring piece. Before bending the ring, punch a 1/2" hole, to receive the hook tenon, in the center of the swell. The swell will flatten slightly. Clean and round up the hole with a round file. Upset one end of the hook piece into a Hershey Kiss shape, slightly fullering the upset to match the size of the punched hole of the loop piece. Heat the tenon to yellow; spot cool the piece below the tenon with water, and clamp it in the vise, hot tenon pointing up. Place the punched hole over the top of the tenon, and peen the tenon so that it cannot pass through the hole - not as aggressively as you would peen a rivet. Turn the swivel back and forth as it cools for a loose fit. Close and weld the ring. Taper and shape the hook.

swivel hook at the top for hanging the chandelier. The welded links, made from 9" to 10" lengths of $\frac{3}{5}$ " round, were pinched into narrow links before being twisted. The weld is positioned at one end of each link and is clamped in the vise to make the twist, which is accomplished at an orange heat.

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Old Time Blacksmith Christmas tree topper

Made from 5'-6' of 3/8" round stock.

I drew a 5-pointed star on my shop floor, and then handbent each angle to make it match the star size that I wanted. Each bend distance is approximately 4.5 inches.

I then heated up another piece of stock and wrapped it around a Hardee Mandrill to make the base that allows it to set up on the tree top. I then welded the two together and cleaned on the piece before painting it.

Self-Measuring Center Punch

From time to time I've had to drill a succession of equally and accurately spaced holes. Although laying out the hole spacing can be done fairly quickly using a transfer compass, the positioning of the compass points,



scribe marks and, ultimately, the point of the center punch itself, each present the opportunity for a slight error. Over a series of holes, several small errors can stack up, resulting in a significant overall change in dimension. The solution to the

problem is a self-measuring center punch, which is neither new nor original. I first recall seeing one many years ago in an old metal trades manual.

A standard center punch can easily be fashioned into a self-measuring type by drilling a perpendicular hole through its shank to receive a lateral locating rod. A point is sharpened on one end of a small diameter rod (I used ¹/₂" piano wire) and the sharpened end is bent 90° to form the locating *leg*. Cross-drill and tap the punch shank to accept a setscrew which will be used to lock. the adjustment of the locating leg. Although punches are generally regarded as being made of fairly tough steel, I had no trouble drilling a pilot hole through mine with a ¹/₄" diameter tin-coated bit running at 1500 RPM and using a coolant. The dimensions of things are not critical, but care should be taken to insure that the lengths from the cross arm to the tips of the punch and locating leg are identical.

To use the device, set the desired distance between the tip of the punch and the locating leg. Lay out a longitudinal reference line on the work, and punch the location of the first hole. Then place the point of the locating leg in the first mark, and punch a second mark on the reference line. As the locating point is placed in each successive punch mark, a new mark is punched on the reference line. Continue the sequence as needed.
