### **President's Notes:**

On March the 8th I got a brand new granddaughter! First girl born in our family in 30 years. I'm still afraid to hold her cause I figure little girls are more "bustable" than boys!

The basic class booked for 3-18 promptly got overbooked so I decided to have another on 3-4. After calling and emailing folks it worked out that some could change to the earlier date. Now that both classes are behind us I need to thank; Gerald Franklin, Mandell Greteman, JJ, Bruce Willenburg, Dale Dixon, Anthony Griggs, and Tim Jones for all the teaching. As it turned out I was more of a helper than a teacher! If I've missed anyone I am sorry. Also I'd like to give a big thanks to the women that helped feed everyone. LaQuitta Greteman, Sharlene Willenburg, and my wife Carol all worked hard to feed us, and I think they done a terrific job. LaQuitta also worked her fanny off getting everyone registered and keeping the money all straight, along with getting pictures. She even got us to all line up for a group photograph.



For lunch in the first class we had sandwiches and hot dogs. We made some of the dogs, forge dogs. For those of you that are wondering what I'm talking about, we have 2 pieces of 4 inch stainless steel pipe welded together that we heat up red hot then lower them down over 2 weenies that are on stainless steel wires sticking up out of a vise. It cooks them fast on the outside, so you have to lower the pipes down for a few seconds then raise them up for a few more seconds, then repeat this process about 3 times so as to get the weenies hot in the center. It's probably not really fast, and it can't be economical, but it's a bit dramatic, and fun! We kinda weaseled out of doing it when we had the last class. When we were almost done with lunch in the last class, one of the girls made the comment that we had no onions. I thought that was a good thing cause I hate them Devil apples!

We always seem to have trouble getting folks to hit hard enough when they first start out hammering. Some start out just tapping the metal, but then after a bit of coaching, they go ahead and start hitting a little harder, and harder. But others seem to have more trouble breaking out of the tap tap tap thing. It's like they are afraid that they will go to far too fast, and ruin their piece. Another problem with beginners is that they can't seem to understand that to make a point on the end of their stock (as on a leaf, or starting a rat tail scroll) that they need to turn their hammer at an angle, and/or hit the piece at an angle. Most folks just starting to blacksmith want to hold the hammer parallel with the anvil face. And most of the time they will also move up the stock leaving a blunt end. In our last class most of the students did turn their hammer and got a point better than in the first class. Maybe we just explained it better in the last class. I've seen this lots of times before. It almost always seems to be a problem. I wonder if it comes from when they learned to drive a nail, where you really need to hit flat!

We have a member named Chuck Waite that sells forge kits. He makes 2 sizes, both with a fire pot, ash dump, and a removable grate. The pieces are laser cut and fit up very nicely. The smaller one is rectangular, I think it is 12" by 24" and sells for \$50. The large one is shaped about like a home plate in baseball. I think it is 24"by 24" and sells for \$60. He even sends pieces to make a jig used to weld up fire pot. He also sells a weld up guillotine tool kit for \$20. He lives in Tulsa, and I try to keep some of his kits to pass along for him.

Remember to vote for the board member election, and I hope to see you all at the picnic!

### What's My Region?

The four main regions are currently defined within the state by being separated by I35 and I40. (For example, the NW region is anything north if I40 and west of I35.)

All meetings are encouraged. These boundary definitions and regional meeting dates are a suggested framework to facilitate orderly meeting scheduling, planning and promotion with a minimum of overlaps and a maximum exposure to the greatest number of members. Not all meetings fit precisely within a rigid boundary definition and members in an area may want to hold meetings on a date that doesn't match their physical region or at a location other than their own region. This may be especially

true in the center of state for areas that are close to the I35 and I40 boundary crossing. Special events such as shows, fairs, etc. may also dictate adjustments to the meeting dates within a region.

The regions are meant to be a simplification and clarification to the regional boundaries rather than a rigid restriction to any meeting scenario. Saltfork members all belong to one club. Regional boundaries are not intended to imply division within the club, but are intended to help spread distribution and promote monthly meetings.


### **2017 Quilt Show**

# All Regional Meetings are Free to Attend and are Always Open to Any Member or Guest...




# **Around the State...**



# The Old Man Tool An On-The-Spot Blacksmith-Made Tool

story & illustrations by Celeste Flores, Oakland

I'm making an old man, John Weiner responded casually to anyone who would ask.

We were in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in a large and beautiful park called Plaza Irlanda. Thirty-eight of us ventured over here – some dancers, an architect, a photographer and twenty blacksmiths from all over the U.S. as well as Timofey from Russia. We had finished setting up our equipment in anticipation of forging two large sculptures and a bench for the park in the next three days. We knew that blacksmithing tools were scarce and the supplies we needed were hard to come by. So the blacksmiths and our indispensable crew brought half a ton of tools with us on the plane to Argentina.



Argentina had once been home to highly accomplished craftsmen from many different fields. Downtown Buenos Aires boasted a smithy where a thousand blacksmiths once made their living. The building burned down in 1919 and was never rebuilt. The government did not support the trades,



and as a result, much of what was known was not passed along to subsequent generations. There is evidence of this in the beautiful decaying buildings that populate Buenos Aires.


On that first day, before our larger projects, everyone set out to play. We made leaves and flowers and letter openers. And John Weiner made *The Old Man*. It turned out to be a simple handheld lever that sits on the back of a power drill and connects to the work to be drilled via a chain. It was a simple tool that proved to be invaluable when drilling dozens of holes through ½" plate. Many of us could think of a time when that tool could have come in handy. And for me, it represented the resourcefulness of blacksmiths, a resourcefulness that I recognized in my colleagues from the States and also in our new brother Herreros from Argentina.

We were there to share our tools and our knowledge, and also to learn from each other. I was inspired by the skills, adaptability and resourcefulness of our fellow blacksmiths in Argentina. And this simple tool represents a lot of what I learned on that trip.


### The Old Man Tool


- Begin with 22" x 1" x ¾" material. Mark one end at 5" on the ¾" face. Use a top and bottom fuller to reduce from 1" to ¾" at its smallest point. This will segregate the material for the handle.
- Forge the 5" of material into a square about ½" on either side. Rotate the material onto the diamond, and knock down the corners to get rid of the sharp edges.
- Draw a one-sided taper on the other end about 4" in length.
- 4. Find a nice, strong drill that you like to use. Find an area of the anvil horn that approximates the radius on the back of your drill body. With the taper facing down, center your horn about 6" back from the start of the taper. Hammer the material onto the horn until the smallest area is about ½".
- With the taper facing up, hang the last ½" of taper over a rounded edge on the far side of the anvil.
   Tap the taper over the edge. Feed it forward in increments and gently curve about 2" of taper.
- 6. To use the old man, find a sturdy chain, a bolt that fits through the chain, a nut and two washers wider than the chain link. Mark the spot to be drilled with a center punch. Use the bolt to secure a loop of chain around the piece to be drilled. Place the drill on the center punch and the old man on the back of the drill. Secure the tool to the piece to be drilled by slipping one of the links over the curve of the taper. Hold onto the handle and drill. •




#### THE FRIENDSHIP KNOT

By: Tommy Ward

The blacksmith's bag of tricks includes techniques intended to impart metal with the illusion of being something else and give the observer cause to wonder. A perfect example is this simple bending exercise that suggests the appearance of a rope knot. The knot theme can be further developed into a useful accessory such as a hook for hanging a coat, hat, or what have you. The knot makes for a nice little gift - particularly when the recipient is told the story of its tradition. Walt Scadden performed the knot during his demonstration of nautical ironwork at Tannehill this year, and I was intrigued as much by his account of the knot as I was of the procedure for making it.

Walt's shop in Connecticut is near Mystic Seaport, an area renown for traditional boat building, For years Walt has supplied authentic iron work to the wooden ships that come to the port for outfitting or repairs, and he has made a habit of presenting a visiting vessel with one of his metal knots as a gesture of good will and friendship. Hence, the "Friendship Knot." Walt is passionate about preserving and furthering the craft of blacksmithing, and what better way to honor the tradition than by making a "Friendship Knot" for a friend. And don't forget to share the story with them.







#### (1) Forming eye

Starting with a piece of X" rod about 12" long, form an eye resembling

a big cotter pin. The inside diameter of the eye should be a smidgeon over % of allow both legs of another pin to pass through it.








(2) Two pins

Make two identical pins with the eyes bent up twenty degrees or so. Try to keep the eyes as compact as possible to improve fit



### (4) Pulling knot

Take a bright heat on the center of the assembly, place one end in the vise, grasp the other with a heavy set of tongs, and give the "knot" a quick, heavy tug to draw it tight. You may want to put soft jaw liners in the vise to prevent marring the legs. Quenching the ends of the legs before clamping may help isolate stretching to the knot area. With some practice you should be able to get a fairly tight knot in one or two heat.

### (5) Tight knot

This is how the finished knot should look. The tighter the fit, the more "rope-like" the joint will appear. You may improve the fit somewhat by working the loops and necks of the eyes with a light cross peen hammer in the areas indicated by the arrows, but be aware that working the knot cold can loosen it.

One of the pleasant surprises at ABANA's Ashville Conference this summer [ed. 1998] was Roger Bockstaele from Belgium. Roger is a retired machinist who forges as a hobby in the attic of his home.

### Sliding/Locking Fits? Use the "proper" L/D Ratio:

Occasionally, projects call for fitting a sliding collar over a smaller rod or tube with the intent of either sliding freely along the length of the device or locking in place with an eccentric load depending on the application. This would be used, for example, on a stock support arm which is intended to automatically lock in place when raised or lowered on its stand.

I remember a rule of thumb that I was taught many years ago to be used when designing such a fitting. It was called the "L Over D Ratio." To summarize, when a sliding fit is always needed, make sure the length of the slider is at least twice the diameter (or width if using non-round stock) of the piece on which it is to travel. If you, instead, want the slider to lock when an eccentric load is applied (as in the case of a support arm to one side) then using an L/D of about 1 is more appropriate. The ratio is not exact and may depend on a lot of other variables including roughness of the material, how much gap between the inside and outside piece, etc. But the general relationship can be kept in mind when designing lighting stands, stock support stands, etc. which use this type of self locking design element. Keeping this ratio in mind should get you close to the desired result most of the time. - Editor


I wish that I could take credit for this handy little Blacksmith Helper. I received this stand from a

fellow that got it out of the Allegheny County Workhouse, which was located in Blawnox, Pa. The workhouse had a blacksmith shop as well as many other shops. When the facility was closed my friend gave me the stand.

It is a handy little thing, just right for keeping off to the side and moving it into position when forging long items that need to be supported. Being light-weight, reaching for it, and adjusting the height can be done with one hand while holding onto the material being forged.

The original stand is a mixture of traditional forging and newer arc welding. I decided to keep it that way when reproducing a couple more. The way the support piece moves up and down through the adjusting device, it is locked into place by the downward motion of the top bar.

To make this helper, begin by making the feet. Take the three pieces of 1/2" rebar and forge the ends over. The one end is forged over 1" and the other is forged in the opposite direction at 1-1/2". The three one inch ends will go up into the pipe, of which a small flair is forged. The flair permits the three pieces of rebar to fit. The 3/4" round bar is split back 4" on the one end and forged into the "T". For the adjusting device, I start out with a longer piece of the 3/4" x 1/4" bar



so that I can hold onto it without using tongs. The piece that goes around the top of the pipe I measure back 5" and center punch on the edge and measure up from that mark 4" and center punch again. At these two marks, I forge it to a somewhat 45 degree bend and forge it around to match up the marks. I have found 4" to be enough to slip over the pipe. At this point, you should have an eye large enough to fit over the pipe and the remaining material should be over lapped onto itself.

The piece is then brought up to a welding heat and forge welded about 2" back from the eye. The pieces are welded together just enough to stick, no need to reduce the size down at all. Heat the piece up again past the 2" section and clamp in the vise and put about a 80 degree bend starting at 2" from the eye. This remaining piece should not be welded together and will be opened up later to accept the top piece. Open up between these two pieces so that the top bar will move freely between them. The top piece has a smaller eye, one that should take about 3-1/4" of material for the eye. First forge a taper on the end, measure back about 1" or so, center punch once again on the edge, measure from that mark 3-1/4" center punch again and forge into the eye. This eye needs to be large enough to allow the 3/4" round bar to travel freely; so if it is tight you need to forge a bigger one! This top bar is riveted to the bottom bar, line them up when they are placed in a parallel position to each other and mark for the holes and drill. Tack the feet pieces together, place the pipe over the rebar and weld the pipe to the feet, use a level to get it plumb. Weld the bottom "eye" piece to the top of the pipe, rivet the top "eye" piece to the other and slip the "T" support bar into place.
