All Regional Meetings are Free to Attend and are Always Open to Any Member or Guest...



What's My Region?

The four main regions are currently defined within the state by being separated by I35 and I40. (For example, the NW region is anything north if I40 and west of I35.)

All meetings are encouraged. These boundary definitions and regional meeting dates are a suggested framework to facilitate orderly meeting scheduling, planning and promotion with a minimum of overlaps and a maximum exposure to the greatest number of members. Not all meetings fit precisely within a rigid boundary definition and members in an area may want to hold meetings on a date that doesn't match their physical region or at a location other than their own region. This may be especially true in the center of state for areas that are close to the I35 and I40 boundary crossing. Special events such as shows, fairs, etc. may also dictate adjustments to the meeting dates within a region.



The regions are meant to be a simplification and clarification to the regional boundaries rather than a rigid restriction to any meeting scenario. *Saltfork members all belong to one club.* Regional boundaries are not intended to imply division within the club, but are intended to help spread distribution and promote monthly meetings.

Floor Stand Candle Holder By Bill Corey

This is a floor stand candle holder I forged for my Masonic Lodge:



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


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Then I forge welded a basket twist following Mark Aspery's instructions on You-Tube forming a "node" on the "stem" then forge welded this to two pieces of 1/2" square bar.



Then I forged a tenon on one end that would later be attached to the base, and forge welded a short piece of 1/2" square around the other end, forging it into a hexagon shaped decorative knob adding a short twist just under it.





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I then cut 3 bobeches (drip cups) out using a 3 1/2" hole saw on my drill press and forged 3 candle cups from 1" steel tube.

This was followed up by forging 3 scrolls from 4' 3" of 1/2" square and 2 scrolls from 20" of 1/2" square and then attaching all 5 of these scrolls to the stem using 2 collars of 1/4" X 1 1/2" flat bar following the instructions in Francis Whitaker's "The Blacksmith's Cookbook.



Then on to the finishing, I started with "Black Magic" patina that blends in the forged and filed finishes quite well and coated it soon after with "Metal Oil" finish both from Sculpt Nouveau. - Bill Corey

Stone Anvil by Gerald Brostek

A couple of months back I forged a set of stone carving tools from sucker rod (*May 2020 Newsletter, Members Gallery Page 14 - Editor.*)

I finally found a large stone, 800+ lbs. Limestone, from the scrap pile at the stone quarry in Silverdale Kansas. Because it was from their scrap pile, and they had to load it, they charged me \$20 bucks. This large stone has lots of flaws, like holes and soft spots. I carved away about 400 or so pounds to create this stone anvil. I sealed it with two coats of concrete sealer. It was both a fun and challenging creation and nice to think that I may be the only person in Oklahoma to have a stone anvil.- Gerald Brostek

Twisted Friedrich Cross Jered Hampton

Hampton Forgeworks, Sutter Creek

Editor's Note: this is an interesting variation on the traditional Friedrich Cross. Jered told me that this idea is not original to him: he saw this on Pinterest, in a post with no attribution. He would like to give credit to the originator, but doesn't know who that is. He figured out how to do this by himself. - CBA Editor

For these twisted Friedrich's or split cross you're going to start by making a standard Friedrich's cross.

With the only difference being the amount of overlap in your cuts. For a standard cross I overlap my cuts the same amount as the cross-section of the stock I'm starting with. For example on a piece of 1/2" stock I overlap my cuts 1/2".

For the twisted crosses your minimum overlap will need to be <u>twice</u> the crosssection of the material. So instead of the 1/2" overlap on 1/2" diameter material it would be a minimum of 1" of overlap. More

than the minimum overlap only affects the aesthetics, your cut line will run further down the arms of the cross.

Twisted Cross

The first step after your cuts is to open the arms to create the cross. I've found that a rawhide or wood mallet and a hot cut hardy works best for the initial opening, moving to the horn then the face of the anvil as the opening progresses.

Once it's open you will cut the excess off of one of the long arms making it the top. I usually cut it to the same length as the two shorter arms.


Now that the cross is made the "twist" will be the next step.

You will put two of the arms into a vise then twist or roll the other two arms down towards the center of the cross.

Remove the cross from the vise, flip it over and clamp one of the arms you just twisted.

Now you will twist the second set of arms in towards the center of the cross, twisting in the same direction as the first set of arms were.

To finish off and tighten the twisted area gently tap the twist with a rawhide or wood mallet on the face of your anvil.



Twisted Cross

The final step is to clamp the long arm into your vise and straighten the arms into the shape of a cross. I've found that the best way to even the arms up after it's back into a cross is to drop one arm into your hardy hole and gently tap the arms that are on the anvil face until they sit flush. You can do this with each of the arms until you're satisfied with the look of your cross.




Fish Key Fob,

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


